## **Target Population**

Older persons (with the age of 60 and above) and people with a disability<sup>2</sup> (self-reported condition of the body or mind (impairment) that makes it more difficult for the person with the condition to do certain activities<sup>3</sup> (activity limitation) and interact with the world around them (participation restrictions) with regards to seeing, hearing, self-care (hygiene), remembering/concentrating or being understood) who are displaced from the Laas Caanood conflict living in collective centers not intended for a living (i.e. schools, community centers). REACH will be using Washington Group Short Set (WGSS) questions to determine the target group of persons with disabilities in the Individual interviews.

The Washington Group Short Set (WGSS) questions have been widely recognized as a reliable and valid tool for identifying persons with disabilities in surveys and censuses. The WGSS questions are a brief and easy-to-administer set of questions that can be used to identify persons with disabilities in the contexts they live in. The WGSS questions are designed to identify persons with disabilities across a range of functional domains, including mobility, vision, hearing, and cognition. This provides a comprehensive measure of disability that can be used to inform policy and programmatic interventions. Using the WGSS questions in interviews for data collection is a reliable, valid, and standardized approach to identify persons with disabilities across a range of

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# 2. Rationale

# 2.1 Background

The escalating conflict in Laas Caanood is yet another crisis facing Somalia, a country already grappling with a severe drought and ongoing security challenges. Laas Caanood city is currently in the midst of a deadly conflict that has resulted in over 170 people being killed and over 500 injured so far. Clashes started on the 26th of Dec 2022 by demonstrations in

Laas Caanood city between Somaliland forces and protestors. Since then, the situation has deteriorated into active conflict forcing most civilians to flee from their homes to neighbouring areas – including Garowe, Buuhoodle and other surrounding districts of Laas Caanood. According to UNHCR, more than 100,000 people has fled to Ethiopia. UNHCR has reported that more than 185,000 internal displaced persons (IDPs) have been displaced by the fighting in Laas Caanood.

REACH is further aware of both previous and ongoing assessments, as listed in the Secondary data sources on Page 3. With this in mind, REACH decided to focus on the information gap regarding older persons and people with disabilities, as per the interest of the protection cluster and AoRs in order to best complement existing assessments and minimise assessment fatigue among the affected populations. For more information on the rationale behind the selection of these target populations, please see Section 3.2.2 Population of interest on Page 7. As the Laas Caanood crisis evolves, REACH may launch other assessments in tandem with the humanitarian response to address key information gaps as they evolve in real-time.

REACH will conduct a rapid assessment in the collective centers that IDPs resided within 3 areas that have a high concentration of Laas Caanood IDPs in the Sool region. These 3 sites are among the 12 sites where CCCM partners (i.e. ACTED) are providing humanitarian assistance in Laas Caanood to recent IDPs from other areas within Laas Caanood; and were confirmed by both REACH Operations and ACTED Security as safe for face to face data collection. These 3 sites were not included in the previous 3 OCHA-led inter-agency assessments. The REACH rapid assessment team plans to work with the Protection cluster and AoRs directly in order to support decision making on response prioritization and modalities of assistance towards selected target groups.

# 2.1 Intended impact

This rapid needs assessment aims to assess the quality of inclusion of the most vulnerable populations, particularly people with disabilities and the older persons among recent IDPs, in the current Laas Caanood humanitarian response, the future movement intentions of these vulnerable populations and the drivers behind these movement intentions. Regarding the inclusion of these vulnerable groups in the response, this assessment aims to assess priority needs, shelter needs, protection needs, awareness of the humanitarian assistance available and access to/barriers to this humanitarian assistance. Rapid Assessment findings can then directly inform humanitarian actors' interventions targeting vulnerable groups and increase the overall inclusivity of the current humanitarian response to the Laas Caanood crisis. Separately, as vulnerable groups can mirror or magnify the needs of the larger affected population, Rapid Assessment findings can strengthen the humanitarian response's understanding of needs and future movements with regards to recent IDPs from Laas Caanood in general.

# 3. Methodology

## 3.1 Methodology Overview

The rapid assessment will include individual interviews (II) interviews and focus group discussions (FGDs) to provide an indicative overview of the quality of inclusion of the most vulnerable populations, particularly people with disabilities and older persons among recent IDPs, in the current Laas Caanood humanitarian response, the future movement intentions of these vulnerable populations and the drivers behind those movement intentions. With regards to the quality of the inclusion of humanitarian assistance, this will include self-identified priority needs, Shelter needs, Protection needs, awareness of/access to humanitarian assistance. All interviewees will be recent IDPs (under 6 months) who are displaced from Laas Caanood and are living in collective centers in the following sites: Afgooye, Higlo fiqi and Qabribayax. Collective centers such as public places, schools community centers et al will be targeted; and the collective centers which have the highest number of displaced people will be selected. Thus far, there are no new settlements/camps where displaced individuals have settled; instead, the majority of people are living in host communities and public places, with some sleeping under trees. More information on site selection can be found in Section 3.2.1 on Site selection criteria on Page 6.

To best assess people with disabilities, REACH will rely on IIs rather than FGDs. This is to best capture the individual quality of disability – as each person with a disability possesses a unique disability and develops individual coping strategies unique to the individual and to the disability. To keep within budget, enumerators will interview 8 IIs per site, for a total of 24 IIs. In contrast, REACH will rely on FGD participants to assess the older persons. FGDs will be disaggregated by gender – all male participants will be in one FGD, all female participants will be in another FGD. There will be 6 – 8 participants per FGD. FGDs– i.e. all consenting participants meeting both the age requirement (60 years of age) and the displacement

requirements (displaced within six months from Laas Caanood and living in collective centers in the 3 select sites) will be arranged into FGDs. The minimum number of FGDs per site will be two (1 with all female participants, 1 with all male participants), for a total of 6 FGDs. Participants will be selected based on the following specific criteria:

- FGD participants will be selected based on the condition that they had been displaced from Laas Caanood, are older persons and are living in collective centers in the target areas (Afgooye, Higlo fiqi and Qabribayax). Older persons is a person who is older than 60 years of age.
- Ils participants will be selected based on the condition that they had been displaced from Laas Caanood, have a
  disability and are living in collective centers in the target areas (Afgooye, Higlo fiqi and Qabribayax). Disability will
  be defined as a long-term physical, mental, intellectual, or sensory impairments which, in interaction with various
  attitudinal and environmental barriers, hinders the individual's full and effective participation in society on an equal
  basis.

For more key definitions, please see the below.

- **Vulnerable groups:** are those physically, mentally, or socially disadvantaged persons who may be unable to meet their basic needs and may therefore require specific assistance.
- **Person with disabilities**:<sup>6</sup> including those who have long-term physical, mental, intellectual, or sensory impairments which, in interaction with various attitudinal and environmental barriers, hinders their full and effective participation in society on an equal basis with others. REACH will be using the WG-SS set definition which relies on a set of six questions that measure difficulty functioning in six basic actions (capabilities) that could restrict individual participation in social activities. This includes concentrating/remembering, seeing, hearing, walking/climbing steps, self-care and communication.
- Older person: a person who is over 60 years of age.
- **Conflict**: Conflict may be defined as: incompatibility of interests, goals, values, needs, expectations, and/or social cosmologies (or ideologies)..<sup>7</sup>
- Internally Displaced Persons: Persons or groups of persons who have been forced or obliged to flee or to leave their homes or places of habitual residence, in particular as a result of or in order to avoid the effects of armed conflict, situations of generalized violence, violations of human rights or natural or human-made disasters, and who have not crossed an internationally recognized state border. (UNHCR Emergency Handbook). 8
- Collective Centers: are pre-existing communal buildings, such as schools, hotels, religious centers, hospitals, or even old factories or other buildings that host populations displaced by conflict or natural disaster.

# 3.2 Population of interest

#### 3.2.1 Site selection criteria

The following is the rationale behind the geographical areas selected for this assessment:

- One of 12 sites in the Laas Caanood district where CCCM partners (i.e. ACTED) are providing humanitarian assistance where there are high concentrations of IDPs from elsewhere in Laas Caanood living in collective centers;
- One of 12 sites confirmed by ACTED Security as safe to conduct face to face interviews.
- One of 12 sites confirmed as accessible for REACH Operations staff within the April time frame.

## 3.2.2 Population assessed

Out of the estimated 8.9 million People in Need in the 2023 HNO, 1.2 million are people with disabilities and 412,000 are older persons. Existing social inequalities, coupled with competition for limited resources, further marginalizes vulnerable groups including the older persons and people with disabilities in Somalia. Vulnerable groups, including the older persons and people with disabilities, can also face more barriers to livelihood opportunities and access to basic services. As insecurity in Laas Caanood and the surrounding area persists and IDP populations from Laas Caanood remain displaced, REACH aims to provide further information regarding IDPs among these vulnerable groups (specifically older persons and people with disabilities) that maybe less able to both adapt to the challenges of a recent displacement and access the humanitarian assistance that has been made available in response to the Laas Caanood conflict. Despite the reported presence of other vulnerable groups, including women and children, the Protection cluster recommended targeting people with disabilities and older persons due to the lack of humanitarian programming targeting these two groups in the current humanitarian response to the Laas Caanood conflict. The aim is that, by assessing two of the most vulnerable groups within the recent IDP population affected by the Laas Caanood crisis, the assessment can both strengthen the inclusion of these groups within the response and contribute to the overall evolution of the humanitarian response – i.e. assess the "periphery" to improve both the "periphery" and the "center."

#### 3.2.3 Unit of measurement

Each FGD or interview will represent one unit of analysis.

# 3.3 Secondary Data Review

This assessment will rely on the following sources from the ongoing humanitarian response in Laas Caanood. As the Laas Caanood crisis remains dynamic, the REACH team may rely on other sources as they become available.

As the information landscape shifts in response to the Laas Caanood crisis, information gaps are evolving in real-time. The following assessments aims to provide further information regarding the most vulnerable populations within the current response.

# 3.4 Primary Data Collection

#### 3.4.1 Method:

Primary data collection will include (1) semi- structured Individual interviews with specific parameters of vulnerable groups (persons with disabilities) displaced from Laas Caanood conflict; To ensure that the principle of "do no harm" is upheld and to accommodate the mobility issues of persons with disabilities, we have decided to conduct individual interviews instead of focus group discussions. This approach will allow us to gather insights from participants in a private and comfortable setting, while avoiding any potential harm or discomfort that may arise from traveling to a focus group location. In the data collection teams will take all necessary measures to ensure that the interviews are conducted in a respectful and accommodating manner, with a focus on obtaining informed consent and protecting the privacy and confidentiality of each participant and (2) semi structured focus groups discussions with (older persons) to express the displacement related experience that is specific to the older persons. This will include 8 IIIs per site (24 IIIs in total) and 2 FGDs per site (6 in total) to keep within budget; but capture saturation.

Separately, there will be an initial mapping exercise at the start of each Individual Interview or FGD so that participants can map out areas of origin and movement intentions. Participants will draw on the map the intended place they want to resettle to or remain in the coming 3 months. More information on the analysis of this participatory mapping is below.

All data collection will occur in Somali using Somali-language tools. A team of 2 enumerators, 1 facilitator and 1 note taker, will be responsible for organizing and facilitating the FGDs; note taking is chosen over recording, due to protection considerations. One enumerator will be responsible for the facilitation and note taking of each KIIs. Following a 1:1 session with the enumerators after each II/FGD, the Field Officer (FO) will translate the resulting notes from data collection back into English for analysis of the results by the Assessment Officer (AO).

## 3.4.2 Sampling:

Given the dynamic nature of displacements from Laas Caannod and the Laas Caanood conflict itself, this assessment will use a purposive sampling methodology. Field Officers and enumerators will snowball for Individual interviews and focus group discussion participants using the below criteria with regards to eligibility to then purposively select participants (with support from local NGOs and ACTED who are operating in the 3 selected areas) who are eligible and consent to be interviewed. The below criteria will be applied for participants in this assessment.

Criteria for Individual Interview selection (with people with disabilities):

- Informed consent to be interviewed.
- 18 years of age or above.
- Recently displaced from Laas Caanood conflict (within 6 months).
- Living in a collective center i.e. public place, school, hospital, community center not intended for living.
- With a physical disability as defined by the WGSS i.e. difficulty with concentrating/remembering, seeing, hearing, walking/climbing steps, self-care and communication.

Criteria for FGD selection (FGDs with older persons individuals):

- Informed consent to be interviewed.
- 60 years of age or above.
- Recently displaced from Laas Caanood conflict (within 6 months).
- Living in a collective center i.e. public place, school, hospital, community center not intended for living.

#### 3.4.3 Tool:

This assessment will include two tools – one tool for IIs with people with disabilities, one tool for FGDs with older persons. Both tools are open-ended questionnaires with subsidiary prompting questions. The quantitative tool will include questions relating to the following topics: self-identified priority needs, Shelter needs, Protection needs, awareness of/access to humanitarian assistance, movement intentions within the next 3 months and the drivers behind these movement intentions. Embedded within the two tools is a participatory mapping section which is designed to further assess movement intentions. Enumerators will present initial maps showing names of districts of the country for II and FGD participants to label/write their settlement of origin and where they intend to be in the coming 3 months.

These two tools were designed by REACH Assessment staff, in consultation with CCCM, IMPACT HQ, the Protection cluster and Protection AoRs and ACTED CCCM in English and then translated into Somali by REACH Field staff. Data collection will occur in Somali, with the Field Officer translating the notes from data collection into English.

#### 3.4.4 Triangulation

At the end of each FGD and II, the FO will ensure to have a debrief conversation with the enumerators who took the notes during the session. This debrief will allow the FO to read and cross-check the notes and ask enumerators for clarification and/or complete their notes, if necessary. The FO will then send these notes to the AO for analysis – ideally within 24 hours of the initial interview. The AO will then be able to read the notes and ask follow up questions to the FOs and enumerators as required.

# 3.5 Conflict sensitivity and do no harm

REACH rapid assessment will consider conflict sensitivity principles and do no harm in all stages of the research cycle to ensure that protection principles (i.e. Due No Harm and dignity for all peoples) are observed and respected before, during and after data collection.

Safety of REACH Staff and respondents: This assessment will prioritise safety of the REACH field staff, enumerators who are conducting the data collection and respondents. This will include an overall awareness of sensitive issues across the research cycle among the REACH staff, enumerators and respondents, i.e. clan affiliation, political assumptions and possible trauma from the conflict and displacement.

**Safety of REACH Staff and respondents**: This assessment is targeting conflict affected displaced vulnerable groups which will prioritise safety of the REACH field staff, enumerators who are conducting the data collection and target group respondents as well. In addition, with close collaboration with the REACH field team who are already in the ground checked all sensitive issues that may contribute to the conflict such as clan affiliation and political assumptions.

This will include the following actions at different stages of the research cycle:

• Research design and training:

The REACH Assessment team will design the assessment in consultation with the Protection cluster and the Protection AoRs. The Protection cluster and the Protection AoRs will be asked to participate in any trainings regarding the assessment to ensure that key concepts are understood, and sensitive issues are handled appropriately. Prior to the assessment, the REACH Assessment team will connect to any existing Complaint

and Feedback Mechanisms (CFMs) to ensure that any requests for referrals are handled appropriately. All participants, including REACH staff and respondents, will be informed of the ACTED CFM that is covering Laas Caanood.

#### Data collection:

The assessment will prevent and minimise unintended negative effects on respondents, by conducting post assessment de-briefs, discussing of potential risks.

The respondents are entitled to:

- Informed consent: All data collection tools will seek informed consent of the respondents, by explaining respondents about the purpose of the data collection.
- o Confidentiality: the assessment will guarantee to keep the privacy of the respondent.
- Do no harm.
- We are not collecting any information related to:
  - i. War crimes.
  - ii. Armed conflict including parties, key actors, troop movements etc.
  - Any personal experience related to the conflict that might put respondent into risk of trauma.

# • Data processing and cleaning:

All personally identifiable information of the interviewees will be cleaned in accordance with <u>REACH data</u> cleaning guidelines for semi-structured data.

## Data Analysis, and output drafting:

All data should be presented in the form that is clean from political assumptions and any sensitive topic that deems to be conflicting with the data.

## • Output dissemination:

Clear communication to be established between the partners and once the final outputs are ready to be shared.

# 3.6 Data Processing & Analysis

At the end of each day, the FO will ensure to have a debrief conversation with the enumerators who took the notes during the session. This debrief will allow the FO to read and cross-check the notes and ask enumerators for clarification and/or complete their notes, if necessary.

Notes will be taken in English, even though discussions will be led in Somali to avoid exclusion based on language. For FGDs in particular, if participants give their consent, the discussions will be recorded using mobile phones purposed for data collection. FOs will read the notes after each day of data collection and complete it as he/she sees fit. FOs will be able to listen to the recordings to complete the notes taken by enumerators, in order to check or complete information.

For the participatory mapping component, the Database and GIS team will digitize the maps and produce maps of (1) areas of origin and (2) movement intentions within the next 3 months.

**Note-takers** are responsible for the following tasks during focus group discussions. Firstly, they must record and transcription of all responses that are given during the discussion. This means that they will be taking detailed notes of everything that is being said by the participants. Additionally, they may also be responsible for translating the notes into another language on the following day. This task is important if the focus group discussion involves participants physical movements and gestures. Overall, note-takers role in ensuring that all information from the focus group discussion is accurately recorded and can be used to for the analysis.

Qualitative data processing and analysis will be in line with this IMPACT guidance on qualitative data analysis. The notes of each FGD will be anonymised by the FO and sent to the AO ideally within 24 hours, and data saturation grids for FGDs (1 for FGDs, 1 for IIs) will be developed by the AO to analyse the information gathered.

The AO will follow up with the FO and enumerators for clarifications as required. Cross-case analysis will then be applied for the topics under consideration.

Subsequently, the Assessment officer will conduct a qualitative analysis of the notes using either an Excel saturation grid or the software NVIVO, depending on the team capacities.
