2. Rationale

2.1 Background

Findings from the second round of the Multi-Sector Needs Assessment (MSNA), conducted by REACH in close collaboration with the Information Management Working Group (IMWG) and the Coordination Steering Group (CSG) in Armenia in March-April 2021, and parallel REACH and AGORA assessments indicate that, while the majority of people who were displaced to Armenia because of the outbreak of war in Nagorno Karabakh in September-November 2020 have already returned to Nagorno Karabakh (NK), those who remain are expected to stay for the longer term. According to the findings of the 2nd round of the MSNA, 93.4% of assessed households (HHs) were not intending to move or were unable to communicate their intentions because of the movement of their areas of origin under Azerbaijani control, security concerns regarding returning to NK and other factors that increase their vulnerability. According to the latest approximate numbers from May 2021 around 37,000 people in a refugee-like situation remain in Armenia.⁷ Understanding residual humanitarian and early recovery needs of the remaining population will effectively inform when and how the transition from cash, in-kind, and voucher-based humanitarian support to sustainable interventions of different modalities should be implemented. While the existing assessments provided an overview of livelihood conditions of the refugee-like population in Armenia, including major livelihood needs and challenges faced (in terms of income-generating activities, debt loads, unemployment rates et al), there is a need for a more in-depth sector-specific understanding of the needs of this particularly vulnerable population within the context of a transitioning humanitarian response. The planned comprehensive economic resilience assessment will largely complement the existing quantitative data generated by REACH and AGORA.

2.2 Intended impact

To inform the implementation of voucher-based programming and other emergency livelihood assistance activities of ACTED, PIN, other humanitarian actors, and UN agencies operating in Armenia within this context, REACH is conducting

this complementary economic resilience assessment. As the movement dynamics of the refugee-like population are slowing down, the assessment intends to improve understanding of the current livelihood situation of the remaining refugee-like population and inform the humanitarian actors in programming strategies to address the residual humanitarian and early recovery needs of the targeted population groups. This additional assessment will be sector-specific, with an emphasis on qualitative data collection, and apart from complementing the existing multi-sector needs assessments and informing decision-making on early recovery assistance, will also lay foundations for long-term planning and interventions both by international actors and national/local authorities as relevant.

3. Methodology

3.1 Methodology overview

This assessment will follow a two-step process in parallel with one another. The first step will be a thorough secondary data review, and the second will be the facilitation of focus group discussions (FGD)s. Focus groups were chosen as a preferred method of primary data collection in line with the research objective, which does not require studying statistical trends, but rather saturation of answers related to the researched phenomenon. There will be a total of 21 FGDs conducted, which will be stratified by four groups. The first two strata will be people in a refugee-like situation – men and women, the third will be host communities, and the fourth will be social workers working in municipalities and/or regional employment centers. For host communities, jobseekers who have been unemployed since the beginning of 2020 will be targeted. FGDs will consist of seven to ten participants per group, and there will be a total of five moderators to conduct group facilitation. FGD will last from 60 to 90 minutes.

FGDs will be conducted from the 15th of July to the 6th of August. Using a qualitative methodology for this assessment and non-probability purposive sampling to select FGD participants, this assessment will lead to achieving indicative findings.

3.2 Population of interest

The assessment will target three populations groups: refugee-like populations remaining in Armenia following the 2020 war in Nagorno Karabakh, host communities, and social workers working in municipalities and/or regional employment centers. There will be four strata: women in a refugee-like population, men in a refugee-like population, host communities, and social workers working in municipalities and/or regional employment centers. With respect to the refugee-like population, the study will assess their current livelihood situation and greater opportunities/ challenges for integration into the local labor market, whereas separate FGDs with people in a refugee-like situation and host community members will enable REACH to distinguish between pervasive barriers to employment and those specifically impacting refugee-like populations. The FGDs will measure participation on an individual level as opposed to a household level. The geographic areas covered by this assessment will include 5 regions overall. According to the latest figures of displaced populations in Armenia as of May 2021, approximately 37,000 people remain in a refugee-like situation throughout the country⁸. For the purpose of this research, the areas with the highest concentration of displaced populations will be targeted (see Table 1 below). This includes the capital, Yerevan, in addition to the following four marzes: Syunik, Kotayk, Ararat, and Lori, which have been selected based on the proportions of remaining refugee-like populations and the geographical variance aiming to cover marzes which range from North to South (to ensure geographic diversity and inclusion).

3.3 Secondary data review

Five key sources will be used in the secondary data review (SDR) process. However, any additional secondary data sources providing relevant information on the research topic of this assessment will be considered. The first secondary data source will be the data from the Statistical Service of Armenia (ArmStat) to provide baseline socio-economic and infrastructural profile of the geographic areas of interest and Armenia as a whole. The second will be the UNDP Socio-Economic Impact Assessment of COVID-19 Outbreak in Armenian Communities, which was conducted during the COVID-19 outbreak and will provide an overview of the major economic stressors and socio-economic shocks the populations experienced in 2020. The third and fourth documents will be REACH's December 2020 Multi-Sector Needs Assessment (MSNA) as well as the Second Round of the MSNA. Finally, the key findings of the Agora Capacity and Vulnerability Assessment (CVA) will be utilized to measure the impacts of both the COVID-19 pandemic and the NK conflict on the demand side of the labor market, and specifically the experiences of refugee-like population and host communities in accessing employment opportunities.

3.4 Primary Data Collection

Method:

The assessment will follow a qualitative methodology using a semi-structured data collection tool. Primary data collection will be implemented through FGDs with refugee-like populations remaining in Armenia, host communities, and social workers from municipalities and regional employment centers. FGDs will be conducted in person, and, considering COVID-19 measures, will follow the global IMPACT COVID-19 standard operating procedures, including close adherence to COVID-19 mitigation measures on hygiene, mask-wearing, and social distancing at all stages of the data collection (training, interviews, debrief).

To have an opportunity to test the tool for its length, time, and understanding of questions, the FGDs have been planned to have the first two FGDs (one with the refugee-like population and the other with the host communities) also serve as a pilot. Based on the observations and lessons learned, the questionnaire may be re-adjusted, as necessary, as the team proceeds with the rest of the FGDs.

FGDs will be moderated by facilitators who will be selected from the network of collaborators established through previous IMPACT projects in Armenia (i.e. the MSNA, CVA, etc), based on their proven skills, mutual collaboration experience, and closer acquaintance with the context ensuring high-quality data collection process. Selected facilitators will undergo training during which the REACH staff will present the assessment objectives and methodology, questionnaire/guide to follow during the FGDs, as well as the required debriefing forms to be filled and submitted after each FGD. The distribution of responsibility

will be as follows: each selected region will have one recruiter assigned; hence there will be five recruiters in total. The role of the recruiter will be to work directly with REACH's field coordinator to identify research participants. The role of the facilitator, on the other hand, will be to moderate the FGD and thereafter, transcribe the recorded discussions. Once the data is gathered, external translators will be employed to translate the transcriptions from Armenian to English.

Sampling:

A non-probability purposive sampling approach will be followed to identify participants for the FGDs. Each FGD will be conducted with an estimated 7-10 participants, who will be selected through the outreach of project consortium members and/or in coordination with the regional (marz-level) and/or local (community-level) authorities. Institutional partners will support the identification of FGD participants from the target groups by providing contact lists for outreach purposes in the respective regions where the research will take place. The recruiters will conduct direct outreach to the regional employment centers and municipalities, which will support the participant recruitment process overall.

FGDs with the refugee-like population will be conducted with people in a refugee-like situation who were gainfully employed in the NK but are currently not working. FGDs with the host communities will be conducted with hosting community members who have been unemployed from the beginning of 2020 until the present moment. Stratifying by population groups will support REACH in distinguishing between pervasive barriers to employment and those specifically impacting refugee-like populations.

Additionally, FGDs with people in a refugee-like situation will be separated based on male and female participants to identify gender dynamics in the context of the specific economic challenges impacting women and men, whereas the FGDs with hosting communities will be conducted in a mixed format (male and female participants together).

Based on the known distribution of people in a refugee-like situation, the following table shows the distribution of FGDs across marzes and the four strata.

To ensure proper coverage of the specific challenges and coping mechanisms, as well as labor market opportunities available both for host communities and the refugee-like population based on the community type, FGDs will ensure proportionate participation from urban and rural communities.

In terms of the background of the participants, each FGD will also ensure proportionality based on age, level of education, and previous sector of expertise. This will ensure diversity and capturing of a wider range of possible challenges, practices, and coping strategies. FGD participants who are social workers working in municipalities and regional employment centers will only be selected based on profession.

Tools:

A semi-structured assessment guide/questionnaire will be developed and later customized for each population group. The guide will be built in consistency with the research objectives and research questions, and allow for maximum possible elaboration and exploration of the topics.

Triangulation/ Monitoring:

Data collection will be overseen by a REACH's field coordinator and monitored from the Yerevan field office. In terms of survey content, it will be subject to daily data transcription by the facilitators and will be handed over for translation upon completion. Facilitators will also be briefed and debriefed by the field coordinator and the national assessment officer in which they will provide feedback to the facilitators and recruiters should any issues within the data collection process be registered. Additionally, weekly field visits will be scheduled by the assessment officer and the field coordinator to ensure the quality of data collection.

3.5 Data Processing & Analysis

The SDR will serve the purpose of identifying the gaps in the available information in economic/livelihoods sectors as well as providing an overview of the recent market dynamics based on the available statistics. In this regard, there will be no data cleaning conducted specifically for the SDR, rather a review of indicators available in different sources, such as ArmStat, MSNA, etc. Generally, SDR is not going to answer most of the research questions, as the secondary data does not have information regarding the economic and livelihoods needs of the affected population groups; it is rather linked to the research question 2.3 aiming to describe the current state of affairs on the labour market, focusing on spatial disaggregation of the economic trends. The report on the SDR will further link to the analysis based on the results of the FGDs.

Data collection will be implemented by FGD facilitators using a semi-structured questionnaire/guide. FGDs will be recorded and respectively transcribed after the actual discussion. Transcriptions will be anonymized and later translated to English as part of the final data package. In case one or more participants refuse to have a discussion recorded, less detailed anonymized meeting minutes will be used instead of a transcript of the recording. Once the transcriptions are ready and duly translated, all the recordings will be deleted. The collected data in the form of transcriptions will be reviewed once submitted by the moderators and will be coded into the Data saturation analysis grid by the REACH staff, adding new discussion points as they occur. The further findings will be analyzed through the narrative analysis as per guidelines for qualitative data processing.⁹ Data analysis will be conducted based on the data saturation analysis grid and the facilitator observations (filled in the debrief forms). The final data package will include the questionnaire/guide, FGD transcriptions (translated to English), data saturation analysis grid, and debrief forms. All personally identifiable information will be removed during the transcription stage and will not occur in the final data package. The findings will be shared with the partners in the form of a final report.
