### 2. Rationale

### 2.1 Background

The United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) is the leading global environmental authority that sets the global environmental agenda, promotes the coherent implementation of the environmental dimension of sustainable development within the United Nations system and serves as an authoritative advocate for the global environment. This consultancy is a home-based post under the supervision of the resource efficiency regional coordinator. UNEP's work in the area of resource efficiency focusses on supporting regions, countries and businesses in their transition to inclusive green economies. This involves promoting green finance and investments, sustainable trade, mainstreaming of green economy pathways into sustainable development planning and sectoral policies in order to decouple (i.e. delink) economic growth and activity from environmental impact while improving human well-being and job creation. Through its focus on Inclusive Green Economies, the programme pays specific attention to the social dimensions of sustainable development and green economy. Fostering equality, equal participation and the creation of decent jobs are central to human well-being. Sustainable lifestyles and consumption patterns are also essential in this regard. Through changing behaviour and consumption patterns, powerful market signals will be sent that will enable the transition to inclusive green economies. Jordan was one of the first countries in the region to explore the prospects for a green economy through a study supported by UNEP in 2010 "Towards a Green Economy in Jordan". The study reviewed the state of investments in Jordan and the implications for a transition towards a green economy. It tackled the economic, social and environmental challenges of Jordan, and identifies the sectors that appear to offer a significant potential for green investment to drive a transition towards a green economy. In 2013, UNEP continued its support to Jordan to help transform to a green/circular economy through the SwitchMed<sup>5</sup> program which

included the development of the <u>Sustainable Consumption and Production National Action Plan</u> (SCP-NAP)<sup>6</sup> and the Pilot demo projects. During the development of the action plan in 2014, the Council of Ministers approved the establishment of the Green Economy Unit within the Ministry of Environment. In response to the emerging Covid-19 pandemic, the Jordanian government announced a set of measures and incentives to address immediate liquidity and cost of financing concerns for various sectors/businesses, and vulnerable households. In spite of this, the lockdown imposed drastically impacted Jordan's economy, and elevated the unemployment rate to reach 24.7% in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of 2020<sup>7</sup>. It also limited eco-tourism activities, causing an approximate loss of 3 Million JODs for the year 2020. As UNEP aims to continue supporting West Asia countries in Building Back Better post Covid-19, special focus has been given towards the role of the humanitarian sector in Jordan and its contribution to shifting to a more circular economy.

### 2.2 Intended impact

Under the Resource Efficiency Regional Coordinator, and in full collaboration with partners in the region, the main objectives of the partnership between UNEP on one hand and the NGOs ACTED, IMPACT Initiatives (IMPACT) on the other, are to understand the landscape of circular economy activities being implemented under the 2020-2022 Jordan Response Plan (JRP), identify gaps and opportunities for further growth of such activities under the plan, and develop actionable guidelines and tools to support partners further integrating circular economy activities into their interventions under the JRP. The outputs of this collaboration should act as catalysts to trigger discussion and action within the Jordanian humanitarian response and serve as a blueprint for the partnership to roll out similar activities in the region. The implementation of this programme further intended to improve the sustainability, value for money and equity of ongoing and future humanitarian response activities in Jordan.

## 3. Methodology

#### 3.1 Methodology overview

The purpose of the assessment will be to map humanitarian actions under the Jordan Response Plan (JRP), which incorporate elements of circularity (intentionally or unintentionally) and develop a typology of actions by sector. These reference points will be used to articulate definitions of circularity by sector (what do we mean by circular economy when we refer to WASH vs when we refer to Shelter, for example) and frame our understanding for further integration of circularity under the JRP. The assessment should give a holistic understanding of the current ways in which partners are implementing circular economy activities under the JRP and related opportunities for shifting towards circularity specifically in the humanitarian field. The assessment will follow a qualitative methodology composed of approximately 58 key informant interviews (KIIs) with national stakeholders (e.g. line ministries), donors and response implementation partners, with data collection taking place 3-28 October 2021. Based on the outcomes of the assessment, IMPACT, ACTED and UNEP will design a toolkit to be used by all stakeholders working in the humanitarian sector to guide them through shifting their programmes towards circularity. The aim of this toolkit is to be used as a reference for all stakeholders who wish to integrate circularity within their strategies and programmes. The development of the toolkit will incorporate both global best practices for integrating circularity into aid action and the results of the initial assessment.

#### **Key definitions:**

For the purposes of this research cycle, we will use the following definitions:

- Humanitarian Sector in Jordan This refers to programs, projects or actors registered with the Ministry of Planning and International Cooperation (MOPIC) to support the implementation of the JRP
- **Programmes focused on Circular Economy** Those programs implemented in support of the JRP by actors registered with MOPIC (humanitarian actors) which **intentionally** do any of the following:



- Design out waste and pollution
- Keep products and materials in use
- Regenerate natural systems

#### Circularity

- Inspired by nature-based solutions, circular models keep material at the highest possible value along the value chain
- The entire value chain matters more than each stage individually
- All stakeholders are engaged in changing the system
- Lifecycle thinking enables the identification of strategic intervention points
- Disconnecting natural resource use and environmental impacts from economic activity and human wellbeing is essential
- These points are illustrated below

#### 3.2 Population of interest

The assessment will focus on (stakeholder mapping) actors responsible for guiding humanitarian activities in Jordan under the JRP (e.g. national stakeholders, primarily line ministries), as well as implementing partners and donors whose activities under the JRP include one or more of the elements defining Circular Economy outlined in section 3.1 above. All such activities being implemented in Jordan will be considered (country-wide geographic scope). The unit of analysis will by the organization (for implementing partners and donors) and sector (for national stakeholders, implementing partners and donors). Outputs of the assessment will be structured to produce a discussion of findings by JRP Sector (Public Services,

Health, Education, Shelter, Economic Empowerment (Food Security, Livelihoods), WASH, Social Protection and Justice) as relevant. The research will not engage with affected populations at this stage.

### 3.3 Secondary data review

The assessment will include a review of available secondary data to support framing of findings within the specific context of Jordan and broader global discussion on Circular Economy. This review will include general resources on circularity, more specific resources developed by humanitarian responders to guide their own organizational activities, other academic/market research pieces, and key documents produced by the Government of Jordan to guide their national approach to sustainability and green growth.

### 3.4 Primary Data Collection

**Methods** – Data will be collected from Key Informants (KIs) engaged in the implementation, funding and guiding of humanitarian activities in Jordan under the JRP. Data collection will be led by IMPACT's Global Partner Support Coordinator (GPSC)/ Senior Assessment Officer (SAO) and Senior Field Manager (SFM), who will jointly implement data collection. Where relevant (e.g. pre-existing relationship with critical KIs), ACTED's Accountability, Monitoring and Evaluation Unit (AMEU) will support data collection activities. These KIs will include:

- National Stakeholders involved in the guidance of programming implemented under the JRP such as representatives from key line ministries will be interviewed to capture the perspective of response leadership on issues related to Circular Economy in Jordan. These will include:
  - Ministry of Planning and International Cooperation / National Planning Council (MOPIC/ NPC)
  - Ministry of Agriculture (MOA)
  - Ministry of Environment (MOENV)
  - Ministry of Local Administration (MOLA)
  - Ministry of Social Development (MOSD)
  - Ministry of Water and Irrigation (MOWI)
- Implementing partners such as UN Agencies, United Nations Country Team (UNCT), INGOs, NNGOs, and CSOs will be interviewed to identify the details of their programming and if/ how/ where they are implementing activities related to Circular Economy. Additionally, KIs from these organizations will including Heads of Programmes, Technical Coordinators, Project Managers and similarly placed mid-senior management with a clear understanding of the organizations' activities. A full list of organizations is being developed and will be appended to this TOR once complete.
- Donors including bi-lateral, multi-lateral, institutional and private foundations will be interviewed to understand their strategy regarding investments in Circular Economy in Jordan, their perspective on programming delivered by their implementing partners. A full list of organizations is being developed and will be appended to this TOR once complete.

IMPACT, ACTED and UNEP colleagues will review tools in a joint training session, jointly (1 member from each organization) pilot the assessment with one respondent from each population group, then jointly revise tools if relevant.

**Sampling** – The research will purposively sample individuals from organizations relevant to the groups outlined above. At present, this sample is estimated at 58, with the sample by group shown below. As noted above, we are developing a comprehensive list of implementing partners and donors and will update the table once available.

**Tools** – The partners (again, IMPACT, ACTED and UNEP) will use a series of complementary semi-structured tools to collection relevant information from each of the populations group to capture a 360-degree perspective of circularity from the perspective of the humanitarian response in Jordan.

- National Stakeholders: Questionnaires will focus on integration of Circular Economy in their sectors, where
  they see opportunity/ need for circularity, and the role of implementing partners and donors in the response
- Implementing Partners: Tools will profile each of their current activities that include one or more elements of Circular Economy (as defined above). This profile will include a summary of the project, identification of which element(s) or Circularity is/ are included, the sector of implementation, donor and approximate budget. They will further assess further plans for implementation of Circular Economy activities, and perspectives on barriers to implementation
- Donors: Data collection tools for donors will be similar to and serve the same purpose as those for implementing partners.
- Impact of COVID-19: There will be cross-cutting questions related to this critical theme integrated into all three tools.

**Triangulation** – Structured review sessions at the end of every day of data collection will be held between the GPSC/ SAO and the SFM, with ACTED AMEU staff joining as relevant (if they have conducted any data collection that day) to ensure completeness of information and share lessons learned among key staff. Additionally, data collected from partners and donor interviews will be triangulated to ensure coherence of narratives related to funding, sectors of implementation, etc. on weekly basis during data collection.

#### 3.5 Data Processing & Analysis

All interviews will be recorded and transcribed daily to supporting processing and analysis. Respondents will be informed that they can opt out of recording at the beginning of the interview. Original notes will be kept for reference until the end of the programme. After transcription is complete, data will be processed according to <a href="IMPACT's qualitative data processing and analysis checklist and minimum standards">IMPACT's qualitative data processing and analysis checklist and minimum standards</a>. The results will be analysed by population group, theme and by sector, and support an indicative comparison within and between population groups.

#### 3.6 Outputs

An **initial presentation of findings** will be made at a **Joint Analysis Workshop (JAW)** hosted by the partners and consisting of key stakeholders from each of the 3 population groups. This element will be critical to establishing credibility of the findings of assessment, and will specifically be used to formalize recommendations for endorsement by participating stakeholder related to identifying and building linkages with circularity in the existing response plan.


Following the JAW, a **comprehensive report** addressing the research questions outlined in section one will be drafted for validation by the three partner organizations. This report will clearly map projects and stakeholders implementing Circular Economy activities under the JRP, outline barriers to implementation and the impact of COVID-19, and identify linkages with circularity within the JRP to encourage future programming.

Based on the outcomes of the assessment, IMPACT, ACTED and UNEP will design a **toolkit** to be used by all stakeholders working in the humanitarian sector to guide them through shifting their programmes towards circularity. The aim of this toolkit is to be used as a reference for all stakeholders who wishes to integrate circularity within their strategies and programmes. The toolkit will include:

A holistic overview of Circularity within the humanitarian sector in Jordan, while highlighting key sectors, an
executive summary of the assessment conducted during phase 1 should be included in this section, providing the
reader with holistic understanding on what is defined as circularity as well as clear articulations of circularity by
sector, in addition to listing main challenges and opportunities, and include Jordan's key sectors for circularity in
the humanitarian field, using case studies to highlight their relevance

- Custom tools to support response partners to shift programming towards circularity. These may include: how
  circular programmes can be developed; how circularity be mainstreamed among key sectors; how can circularity
  be communicated; how to sustain circular projects.; Etc.
- A circularity checklist and self-assessment tool to understand if a particular project/service is circular. The tool will
  also help the user understand how the project fulfils circularity, what targeted groups does it aim to cover, how
  procurement is conducted, the volume of waste produced by projects, and what key sectors are served. This will
  include a scoring mechanism to quantify how circular a project is.
