PROTECTION NEEDS OF CHILDREN, ADOLESCENTS AND THEIR CAREGIVERS DISPLACED FROM UKRAINE

ABOUT

As part of its monthly, longitudinal survey on people displaced by the conflict in Ukraine, between 16 November and 7 December 2022, IMPACT Initiatives, in partnership with Save the Children (SC), interviewed by phone 2,215 displaced adults from Ukraine living with children in their care in Europe and beyond. Respondents were asked about the child protection needs, safety and well-being risks, protective factors, as well as service access of the children in their care and themselves. Respondents were identified through convenience sampling among people who have crossed the border from Ukraine. Therefore, the findings shown in this factsheet are not statistically representative. Sampling was done as part of a data collection initiative implemented in partnership with UNHCR at border crossings, transit sites, and reception centers in Poland, Slovakia, Hungary, Romania, and Moldova. Respondents were also sampled through the dissemination of an invitation to participate via Viber, Facebook, and Telegram. All the figures mentioned in this factsheet refer to households with children displaced outside of Ukraine. The survey questionnaire was developed together with SC. The longitudinal survey is funded by Global Affairs Canada, Swiss Development Cooperation and SC.



Gender and age groups of respondents





Figure 1: Top* current locations of respondents


